## IOWA LAW BULLETIN

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THE COLLEGE OF LAW.—With eighty-seven men enrolled in the first-year class, attendance in the Law College approaches the prewar level. It is interesting to note that the number of students now entering upon law study is exactly the same as in 1913, when a high school course was the preliminary requirement, and in 1914, when students were required to have one year or more of college work to enter as candidates for a degree. Two years of college work are now required for entrance. This year's class is the largest since the two year rule took effect. Sixty per cent of the students in the school have had more than two years of college work. Of the entering class, forty-six exceed the minimum requirements for admission. The following table shows attendance since 1913.
